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Algeria to participate in WorldSkills

Thanks to a cooperation agreement, young technicians at Algeria's Institute for Electrical and Electro Mechanical Engineering will have the opportunity to train for a "guest" spot in the Team Mechatronics Competition in Helsinki next May which has attracted some 26 member countries.

WorldSkills President, Jack Dusseldorp, toured the Institute during a brief visit to Algiers at the invitation of Prof El-Hadi Khaldi, Minister of Vocational Education and Training to discuss Algeria's possible membership of WorldSkills. They agreed the best way to learn about WorldSkills was through the actual experience of the competition as well as participation in the Technical meetings and networking with other members.

The Minister informed Mr Dusseldorp that Algeria was already planning to conduct a first round of skill

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competitions early in 2005, and will be sending an observer delegation to Helsinki. A key project underway in Algeria was the alignment of skill profiles, qualifications and workforce needs, and participation in benchmarking skills standards at the international level was an important complement to increasing the quality of training necessary for competitiveness in the global economy. Festo, one of WorldSkills three global sponsor partners, has offered to support the preparation and training of

support the preparation and training of a guest Algerian Mechatronics team to Helsinki, as part of its technical support agreement with the Algerian Ministry of Vocational Education and Training. Algeria is considering taking up Associate Membership in WorldSkills as a first step towards full membership in time for the 2007 Competition in Japan.

The Belgian National Competition took place on 25 & 26 November in several Competence Centres located in the 3 regions of the country, featuring four categories of skills: construction, technologies (including metal work), artwork and crafts. The event attracted a total of 110 competitors in 16 skills. The Awards Ceremony took place in the prestigious facility "AutoWorld" on 27 November. The Minister of Education for the



Brussels Region, and representatives from the ministries for the Flemish and Walloon Regions attended the event. A concert closed the celebration. The next steps are some team building sessions at the sea- and countryside, and professional training sessions to prepare the team for the WorldSkills Competition in Helsinki in 2005. 'Needless to say, the winners require no motivational training; they're already at the top for the competition!'

The Chairman of the Technical Committee, Liam Corcoran visited the Brazilian National Competition, the "Olimpíada do Conhecimento", last August. He met with 23 people from 11 Latin American countries who were invited to experience a Competition in Brazil on a national level. These countries; Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Columbia, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Paraguay and Peru all expressed interest in WorldSkills.

There are lots of good sides to this profession. I am very interested in everything that has to do with beverages. I like to organise a nice evening with good meals and beverages. I think the bad side of this profession is that you work with shifts and you are never know far in advance how your schedule will look like. The most difficult things for me to learn were the words used in French."
